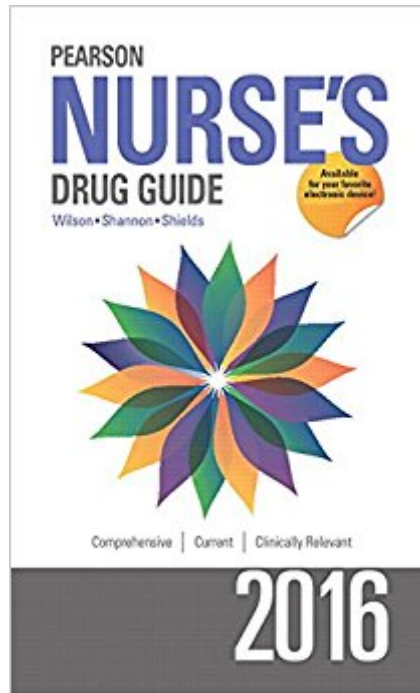




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Pearson Nurse's Drug Guide 2016

IV administration information has been updated regarding adults as well as children.
