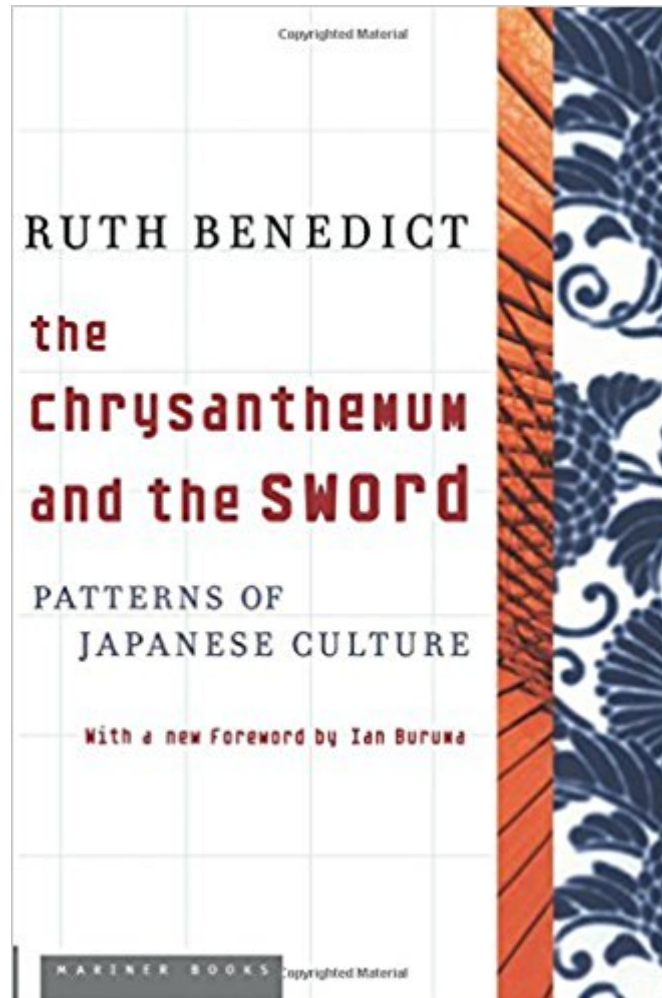




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The Chrysanthemum And The Sword

RUTH BENEDICT (1887-1948) was one of the twentieth century's foremost anthropologists and helped to shape the discipline in the United States and around the world. Benedict was a student and later a colleague of Franz Boas at Columbia, where she taught from 1924. Margaret Mead was one of her students. Benedict's contributions to the field of cultural anthropology are often cited today.

Some things can appear as a little outdated but the core remains. Perhaps it's one of the first books to be read by someone trying to understand people from Japan. Of course, after reading it, some surprises still will be awaiting.

This is a truly wonderful book whichever way you look at it: information, style, and relevance/impact. It was instrumental in determining the successful approach chosen by the US government in designing its policy towards Japan during its occupation (1945-1952) To me, as an enthusiastic

learner of Japanese, a devoted watcher of Japanese films, and reader of Japanese books (still, alas, in translation), this book has given a key to understanding some of the dialogues, scenes... Truly, I recommend reading this book.

The Kindle version contains far too many spelling mistakes and typos which are disturbing while reading. Occurs a few times per page. It is as though someone who does not speak English typed it up from a faded paperback and no-one bothered proof reading it. Despite being written half a century ago, it still rings true and provides much needed insight and understanding into Japanese mentality for someone coming from a Western culture. I read this after 2 years in Japan, and it helped me understand a lot of my experiences. Also, written in an easy-to-read and engaging manner.

I liked especially the descriptions of Zen Buddhism and its basis in the Japanese culture and ethic. I recommend this book for anyone interested in Japan or coming to understand their own culture by contrast with one that is so unique.
