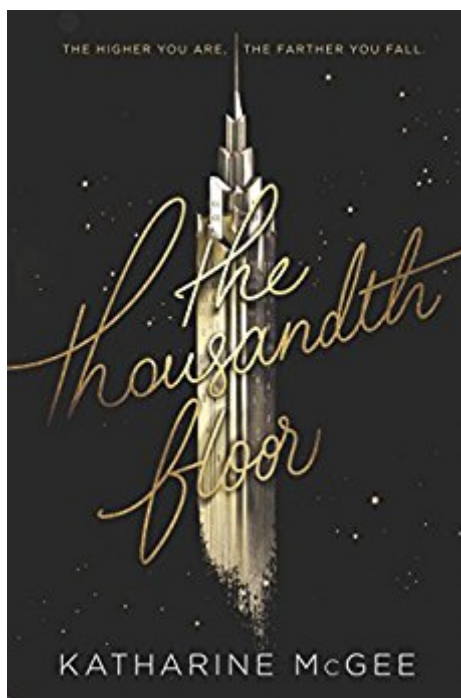

This book reminded me of "Twilight" in that the story revolves around teenagers and their problems (although it takes place in the future). That being said, the writing was MUCH better than Twilight and I enjoyed it. I did not know that it was the first in a series and was totally on edge when it abruptly ended. Unfortunately, the next book is not out yet so I'll have to wait, but I will definitely be reading it.

I'm not done with the book yet but so far I like the concept. I tend to read historical non-fiction and psych books, so this is part of me attempting to introduce more "fun" topics into my life. The idea behind it is really cool and reminds me of a futuristic, YA version of High-Rise (2015) with a touch of the characters from Gossip Girl. I can easily see it becoming a movie. The writing is annoying at times, but if you can get past that the story is cool. It's engaging and I'm eager to see how things tie together in the end. Also, the cover art is pretty. That alone makes me want to finish it so that I can add it to my bookshelf.

Excellent presentation of very different view of the future. Instead of a depressed and downtrodden society, as expressed in, for example, "The Hunger Games" trilogy, the "haves" and "have-nots" have intensified. Social and emotion status rely on financial standing: the higher the floor one lives on is important. Extremely wealthy teens, and those who descend to the lower floors, handle the problems of their age, peers, and pressures in much the same way as today, leading to the very believable climax. Have recommended the book to my daughter, who teaches high school English.

This was much better than I thought it would be. Of course, it's kind of like Gossip Girl.. rich (or poor) kids having what they think is grown up problems. Each chapter is from a different POV that
