

Gr 9 Up "Natalya Kutepova and Alexei Romanov are in love, and though she is not of royal blood, everyone expects that Tsar Nicholas II will allow them to be married. Alexei reveals to her a magical secret: before Rasputin was murdered, he poured all of his power into a Fabergé creation known as the Constellation Egg. The power of this egg miraculously protects the Romanov family, including healing Alexei from his hemophilia. But the egg is unable to protect the royal family from revolution: the year is 1917, and a civil war is on the horizon. Alexei and his family are taken by the Reds. In an attempt to reclaim power for Russia, Natalya and her highborn friend Emilia try to retrieve the egg, but they are deceived and captured. What ensues is a desperate search for the egg in order to

claim the power for either the White or Red faction-but there is a dangerous third group at play that cares nothing for politics and everything for power. The characters in this novel don't quite live up to the clearly well-researched historical detail: they're flat and under-nuanced. The two romances in this book are presented as deriving from Natalya's genuine affection for both Alexei and a young revolutionary named Leo, but neither are well developed enough to address the complicated feelings that would likely arise when one begins to have feelings for the enemy of one's true love. The story is fascinating, however, and the details of the Russian Revolution that are included might inspire students to research Russian history and such characters as Alexei Romanov and Grigori Rasputin. Natalya relishes the privileged swirl of life at the Russian imperial court, especially her status as the intended wife of the tsar's son, Alexei. When Alexei shows her the priceless jeweled egg the royal family harbors, she learns of the magical sway this so-called Constellation Egg has in keeping the ruling Romanovs in power. Part fantasy, part historic fiction, the story shifts from palace life to the revolution, as characters fight to save the egg to protect the Romanovs. Can the girl dreaming of becoming tsarina collaborate successfully with a former servant turned Red to rescue the egg from mystics who have taken it to turn the tide of history? Patrick's tale of Russia, Rasputin, and Romanovs packs in suspense, harrowing escapes, and romance. Without heavy-handedness, Natalya's spirited narration affords readers a sense of what led to revolution as well as the catastrophic impact of war. While liberties are taken with the historic setting, the mystics add an intriguing layer of storytelling, as does the egg's supernatural powers at strategic moments.

Review: Well, I'm still trying to find words to describe this memorable, gorgeous and simply breathtaking story. I read so many praising early reviews, but I was still totally caught off guard on how beautiful, emotional and just brilliant it really ended up being. For the moment, my absolutely highlight of the year. So what's so good about his book? Well, what's not! First of all, the prose is vivid, inventive, detailed, descriptive, smooth it conveys everything necessary and a lot more. I actually felt like I was in the midst of all the places the story took the characters to: St Petersburg, Moscow, the train, the countryside, the Winter Palace, in between the warring Reds and Whites. While I usually shy away from too descriptive books, this one came alive due to that and I loved it for the images it formed in my mind. The writing was superb! The historical background in which the story took place has always fascinated me and the

author was incredibly convincing with all the historical facts and I believe that there was extensive research put into every small detail, this made me respect the author a great deal more. Furthermore, I've read so many books set in different eras, in between huge historical events or even in major cities around the world with extensive history, culture and atmosphere, but most of the time the book just notes that it takes place in this grand place/setting, but when reading the idea simply doesn't reach me and falls flat. I had no such issues here, the story didn't take any prisoners, striking from page one to the last. The plot was quite simple: an aristocrat about to lose everything with the revolution sets out to save the only thing she thinks can restore everything as it was. The story was basically one huge search mission, but that just the skeleton of it. There was so much hope, desperation, wonder, loyalty, discovery, failure and success along the way, which made the story a wonderful journey for me as a reader. Especially since all these emotions the characters were faced with, I too experienced. I also liked the fantasy element of the plot. It was subtle, and not all out Harry Potter, but I felt the magic and mystic powers working perfectly in sync with the adventures of our heroes and the faith of Russia. I also thought the love story was stuff of fairy tales and a complete tearjerker, but maybe not. Knowing what happens to the royal family, I went into the story with the mindset that it was doomed and my heart would be ripped open, stepped on and run over by a bus and then a steamroller. I wasn't too off the mark, but I didn't expect the turn of events that restored my hope in romance in this book. I don't really want to spoil anything, but let's just say that Natalya genuinely loves her prince and vice versa, but life doesn't stop when things don't work out the way you planned and when a door is closed a window is opened and I kind of adored that window opportunity. I thought the ending was stunning in a very simple way as well, somewhat of an open ending, but I felt that everything came full circle. Characters: Natalya I thought was a great heroine, she was a spoiled aristocrat with the biggest catch as an intended, but she didn't annoy me, she didn't make utterly stupid choices, she didn't complain/whine/act like a child, she wasn't selfish, instead she was heroic, responsible, determined, loyal ok, yes, quite naive about why the Reds were protesting and fighting for, but I wouldn't expect someone like her to completely understand having led the life she had. Most of all, she absolutely loved her prince and homeland. Overall: Why aren't more people picking this up? Only a couple of reviews on , only 30ish reviews on Goodreads I can't understand it! So here's my request (demand): please give this a try alone only for how well written this is, if not for any of the other million reasons to read it!
