


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Discovering The Moscow Countryside: An Illustrated Guide To Russia's Heartland

Murrell, the author of eight works on Russia, writes here of her experience of living in Moscow for many years and exploring the countryside around the capital the area studded with towns and villages with fascinating architecture, history, culture, and archaeology. Many of the area's well-known monasteries, cathedrals, and country churches have just recently begun to thrive after the fall of communism. Covering mainly the area within a 90-mile radius of Moscow, Murrell includes the many and varied dachas, the vacation homes of the upper classes before the rise of communism. The book is conveniently divided according to weekend trips along ten major roadways. The table of contents is detailed, the glossary is extremely helpful, and an abundance of maps and a lengthy list of the area's principal architects and artists are included. Unfortunately, this
