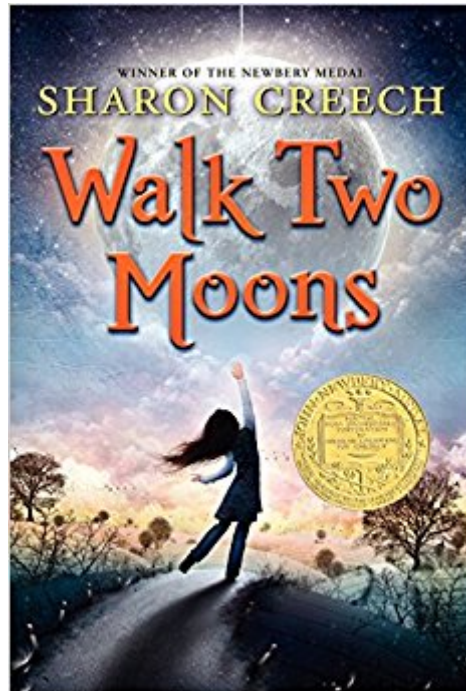

Synopsis

Thirteen-year-old Salamanca Tree Hiddle's mother has disappeared. While tracing her steps on a car trip from Ohio to Idaho with her grandparents, Salamanca tells a story to pass the time about a friend named Phoebe Winterbottom whose mother vanished and who received secret messages after her disappearance. One of them read, "Don't judge a man until you have walked two moons in his moccasins." Despite her father's warning that she is "fishing in the air," Salamanca hopes to bring her home. By drawing strength from her Native American ancestry, she is able to face the

Grade 6-9-An engaging story of love and loss, told with humor and suspense. Thirteen-year-old Salamanca Tree Hiddle's mother leaves home suddenly on a spiritual quest, vowing to return, but can't keep her promise. The girl and her father leave their farm in Kentucky and move to Ohio, where Sal meets Phoebe Winterbottom, also 13. While Sal accompanies her eccentric grandparents on a six-day drive to Idaho to retrace her mother's route, she entertains them with the tale of Phoebe, whose mother has also left home. While this story-within-a-story is a potentially difficult device, in the hands of this capable author it works well to create suspense, keep readers' interest, and draw parallels between the situations and reactions of the two girls. Sal's emotional journey through the grieving process-from denial to anger and finally to acceptance-is depicted realistically and with feeling. Indeed, her initial confusion and repression of the truth are mirrored in the book. Overall, a richly layered novel about real and metaphorical journeys. The lesson about water in a well made me think about how I, a sinner deserving to die, am living on the mercy which I am not even grateful for or sometimes even aware of. When Salamanca stood before her mother's tomb, I became sad only to realize I should be sad when I fail to live a godly and loving life because sooner or later I will also die and after that judgement. I recommend this to everyone, even those who hate sad ending as much as I do. I only regret that I cannot give it another star for all the aforementioned reasons.

I really enjoyed this book as an adult reader. It is about losing a loved one and the book touches some many deep and difficult subjects as Salamanca takes a trip from Ohio to Idaho. Without giving away so much of the book, I can say that there are some of the scenes in the book, I would not recommend kids under 12 to read. Especially the one about still childbirth.
